

Cancer Council WA's work on e-cigarettes

- Policy and advocacy
- Submissions to government, parliamentary inquiries, public consultations on law reform
- Commissioning of research

E-cigarettes and the threat to tobacco control

- Non-smokers who use e-cigarettes are three times as likely to take up tobacco smoking than non-smokers who do not use e-cigarettes
- Most e-cigarette use is not for the purpose of quitting smoking
- High number of e-cigarette users report smoking tobacco (dual use)
- Renormalising smoking
- Tobacco industry interference in policy reform.





E-cigarettes and the law

Products that resemble tobacco products, including ecigarette devices and their components, whether or not they contain nicotine, cannot be sold by tobacco or general retailers under the *Tobacco Products Control Act 2006* (WA).

It is illegal to sell, supply or possess an e-cigarette or any liquid that contains nicotine in Australia without a doctor's prescription.




E-cigarettes are harmful products

E-CIGARETTES HEALTH IMPACTS

Use of e-cigarettes (vaping) has increased rapidly in recent years and is greatest in young people. In 2019, about 5 per cent of people aged 18-24 in Australia reported current vaping.

The global evidence shows that use of e-cigarettes can be harmful to health, particularly for nonsmokers and youth. For most major health outcomes - like cancer, cardiovascular disease and mental illness - the impacts of e-cigarettes are not known, so their safety for these outcomes hasn't been established.







Nicotine concentration

E-cigarette use among young people in WA and Australia

E-cigarette use among young people is common and is increasing

Lifetime use of e-cigarettes

- 32.3% of 14-17 year-olds (2021)
 - NSW residents, CCNSW GenVape
- 7.6% of 15-17 year-olds (2020-21)
 - ABS NHS
- 21.7% of 18-24 year-olds (2020-21)
 - ABS NHS
- 18.4% of 18-44 year-olds (2020)
 - WA residents, HWSS 2020
- 22.3% of 15-24 year-olds (2019)
 - up from 17.1% in 2016
 - NDSHS, Tobacco tables, Table 2.19
- 14% of 12-17 year-olds (2017)
 - ASSAD 2017, table 3.11

<u>Current</u> use of e-cigarettes

- 4.8% of 18-24 year-olds (2020-21)
 - ABS NHS
- 4.5% of 15-24 year-olds (2019)
 - up from 2.3% in 2016
 - NDSHS, Tobacco tables, Table 2.24

Used e-cigarettes in the last month

- 15.8% of 14-17 year-olds (2021)
 - NSW residents, CCNSW GenVape
 - (during Covid-19 restrictions)
- 32% of 12-17 year-olds (2017)
 - ASSAD 2017, table 3.12

4000 vaping suspensions Schools in health crisis amid fears primary students sucked in

Nearly 4000 suspension notices were handed out to kids in public schools for vaping-related offences last year, new figures reveal.

An analysis of Education Department records has uncovered that an astonishing 3732 suspensions were issued for vaping-related incidents, which could include being caught puffing on an e-cigarette or being in possession of vape implements.

The release of the shocking data came as WA's peak parents'

group raised the alarm on a rapid increase in vaping by primary school-aged children.

WA Council of State School Organisations president Pania Turner said parents had reported a rise in the past few months of younger children using vapes.

WACSSO has demanded stronger action by governments to combat problem vaping in a submission to a Therapeutic Goods Association review of vaping.

"It's not enough to say we've got regulations in place, it's the enforcement," Ms Turner said. "Far from being a senior school issue, parents report primary school-aged children being exposed to vaping on school buses, in school toilets and in social settings outside school," the submission said.

"Parents are deeply concerned about the long-term health and wellbeing impacts that vaping will have on children."

The TGA is investigating proposed reforms to nicotine vaping products in Australia, aimed at preventing their use by children and teens, while still allowing adults with a doctor's prescription to use them as a tool to quit smoking.

WACSSO said parents strongly opposed the way vaping products were marketed to children using bright colours and sweet flavours.

The submission pointed to the Government's responsibility to protect children from "blatant marketing" which was luring young people into "an early and potentially lifelong addiction to vaping".

"WACSSO views advertising campaigns, product setting, branding and flavouring that target children and young people as predatory and unethical," it said. "Parents do not want their children targeted by companies wishing to entice them to try their addictive and harmful products."

WA's Education Department rolled out an anti-vaping toolkit in high schools in June.

Last week schools in Victoria revealed a litany of serious vaping-related incidents, including a student collapsing and being taken to hospital after inhaling from a vape.



What about school-aged young people?

- Among students aged 12-17 years in WA, the percentage who reported ever-use of e-cigarettes increased from 12.1% in 2014 to 13.5% in 2017
- The next survey (in field this year) will provide valuable insights into the current use of e-cigarettes, which we expect has increased.







School Strategies

- Anti-Vaping Toolkit: teacher, parent and student resources
- School policy on smoking and vaping
- Bathroom detectors (some private schools)
- Confiscation of products
- Disciplinary procedures



Vapes can have the same harmful chemicals like in cleaning products, weed killer, bug spray and nail polish remover. They just don't put it on the pack. If you need support, speak with your teacher or student services staff at your school.



Gaps and Opportunities

- Prevalence data
- Training for school leaders, school nurses
- How is the toolkit being used by schools?
- Clinical guidelines for vaping cessation in children
- Research on cessation messaging and support for young people
- Better connection with youth development sector and sport/rec
- What are the needs of primary schools?



Anti-vaping Digital Education Campaign

- Healthway has provided funding to Cancer Council WA for an anti-vaping digital education campaign
- Target group: young people aged 14 to 24
- Concept testing to ensure that the campaign will meet objectives:
 - prevent young people from initiating vaping
 - direct young people who vape to quit support
- Social media focus
- Online hub with resources
- Launching later in the year, probably around August



Cancer Council's Policy Asks

NATIONAL

- Seize vaping products at the border unless accompanied by a prescription
- Declare all vaping products 'Prohibited Imports'
- Ban the sale of vapes outside of TGA framework
- Prohibit vaping advertising in a similar way to tobacco products

WA

- Crack down on illegal sales and stockpiling
- Increase penalties
- Clear laws that prohibit the sale, supply, advertising and promotion of vaping products (other than in accordance with the TGA approach)
- Ban vaping in public places where smoking is already banned





Policy update

- Announcement that the Commonwealth will introduce a ban on vaping advertising
- TGA Public Consultation on the Regulation of Nicotine Vaping Products (closed mid Jan)
- Health Ministers' communique 24 Feb:
 - Endorsed National Tobacco Strategy 2023-2030
 - National E-cigarette Working Group
- Funding for WA schools to tackle vaping
